This guide outlines seven red flags to watch for when evaluating movers in DMV areas, based on common complaints and licensing issues reported across the region.

Red Flag One: No Physical Address or Local Presence

A legitimate **DMV Moving Company** operates from a verifiable business address and maintains equipment stored locally. Companies that only list a phone number or a generic online form, with no physical location listed, are harder to hold accountable if something goes wrong during the move.

Red Flag Two: Estimates Given Without an In-Home or Video Survey

Reliable **DMV Movers** typically request a detailed inventory, either through an in-home visit or a video walkthrough, before providing a firm estimate. Companies that quote a price over the phone without any assessment of your belongings often adjust the price significantly on moving day.

Red Flag Three: Large Upfront Deposits Required in Cash

While some deposit is normal for scheduling, demands for large cash payments before any work begins are a warning sign. Reputable movers in DMV neighborhoods accept standard payment methods and only require a reasonable deposit, if any, to hold your date.

Red Flag Four: No Proof of Licensing or Insurance

Every legitimate moving company should be able to provide a USDOT number for interstate moves or a state business license number for in-state moves, along with proof of liability insurance. A company that avoids these questions or provides inconsistent answers should be avoided.

Red Flag Six: A Rebranded Name or Recent Change in Company Identity

Some unlicensed operators change their company name frequently to avoid negative reviews or regulatory action. Search for the company's history and confirm that the name on your contract matches the name on their licensing and insurance documents.



Red Flag Seven: Reviews That Mention Damaged or Lost Belongings Without Resolution

Every moving company may receive an occasional negative review, but a pattern of unresolved complaints about damaged or missing items is a serious concern. Look specifically at how the company responded to these complaints, since a lack of accountability often repeats itself.
