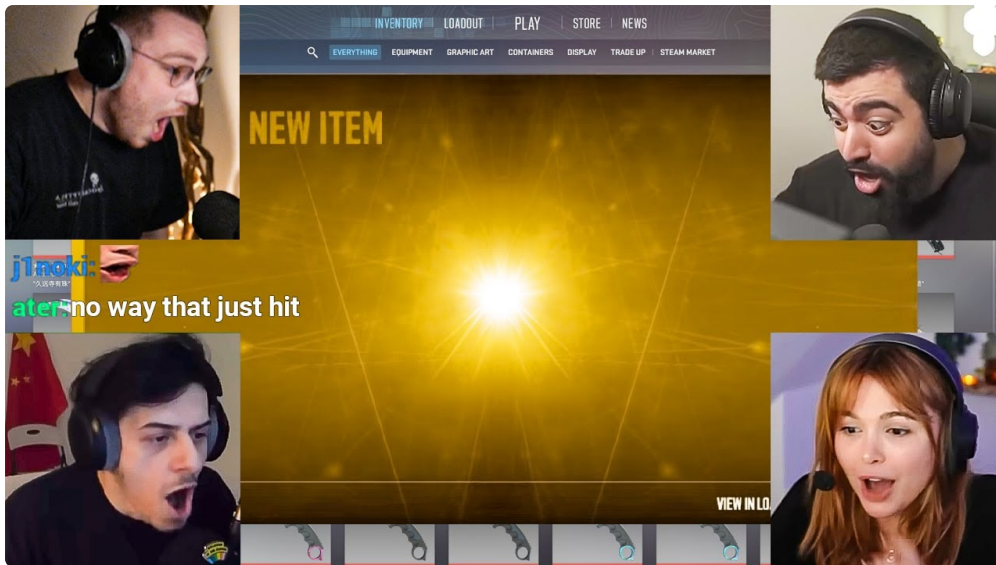
How Does a Case Battle Work Step-by-Step?
