

Newton tends to surprise people who only know it as a Boston suburb. It is close enough to the city for a quick commute, but it has its own rhythm, one built from village centers, old estates, leafy streets, and a stubborn respect for local history. Visitors often come for a day and stay longer than planned. Homeowners often move in for the schools, the transit, or the quiet streets, then discover that living in a place with older housing stock means paying attention to things like drainage, settling, and seasonal moisture.
