4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once purchased, items get in a 7-day trade cooldown, after which gamers can purchase, offer, or trade them easily on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

Unlike numerous games where cosmetic items are bound to a player's account permanently, Rust skins possess real-world liquidity through the Steam Wallet (and third-party markets, though care is recommended). Costs vary based upon supply, demand, and general player count.
