release, alarm, and passive entry).

5. **Ignition Cylinder Repair and Replacement:** Sometimes secrets are lost because they broke off inside the ignition, or the ignition switch itself is worn out. Locksmiths can draw out broken pieces and repair work or replace the ignition cylinder completely.
