Popular Camouflage Sets by Biome

1. Snow Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Arctic Suit, Whiteout collection, or the Sub-Zero equipment.
- *Why:* Allows players to blend perfectly against snowbanks, making ambushes simpler and gets away cleaner.

2. Desert Biome:

- *Top Picks:* Desert Raiders, Sandstorm, or Nomad sets.
- *Why:* Matches the yellowish-brown terrain of deserts, breaking up gamer silhouettes efficiently.

3. Forest/ Temperate Biome:
