Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear. Parts of the paint might look cracked or greatly faded.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Extreme wear. The weapon looks heavily rusted, beaten, or almost removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, while others really look better with greater wear (known as "Blackimovs" on certain AWP models).

2. Rarity Tiers and Drop Rates

Skins are color-coded based on their rarity. This rarity dictates how challenging the product is to obtain through random drops or by opening weapon cases with keys.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer Grade.
- **Mil-Spec (Blue):** Standard quality for many collection drops and low-tier case items.
- **Limited (Purple):** Uncommon; typically utilized as trade-up fodder.
- **Classified (Pink):** Rare, highly sought-after weapon finishes.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest standard rarity discovered in cases, including iconic designs like the AWP|Asiimov or M4A4|Shout.
- **Extremely Rare (★ Gold):** Special products, including Knives and Gloves.

Approximate Case Odds

- **Mil-Spec (Blue):** ~ 79.92%

- **Special Item (★ Gold/Knife/Gloves):** ~ 0.26%
