- **Night Visibility Skins:** Some items include glow-in-the-dark aspects (frequently described as "Glow-in-the-Dark" or "Emissive" skins). While they make you easier to see at night, they permit gamers to navigate their bases or craft items in pitch-black spaces without turning on lights.
