Typical Mistakes to Avoid

- **Weak Opening**-- A forgettable introduction can weaken the entire presentation; begin with an engaging hook.
- **Neglecting Q&A Preparation**-- Judges often check the toughness of a solution during the Q&A segment; anticipate hard follow-up concerns.
- **Poor Time Allocation**-- Exceeding the allotted presentation time can result in point deductions.
