How dispatch and travel shape the job

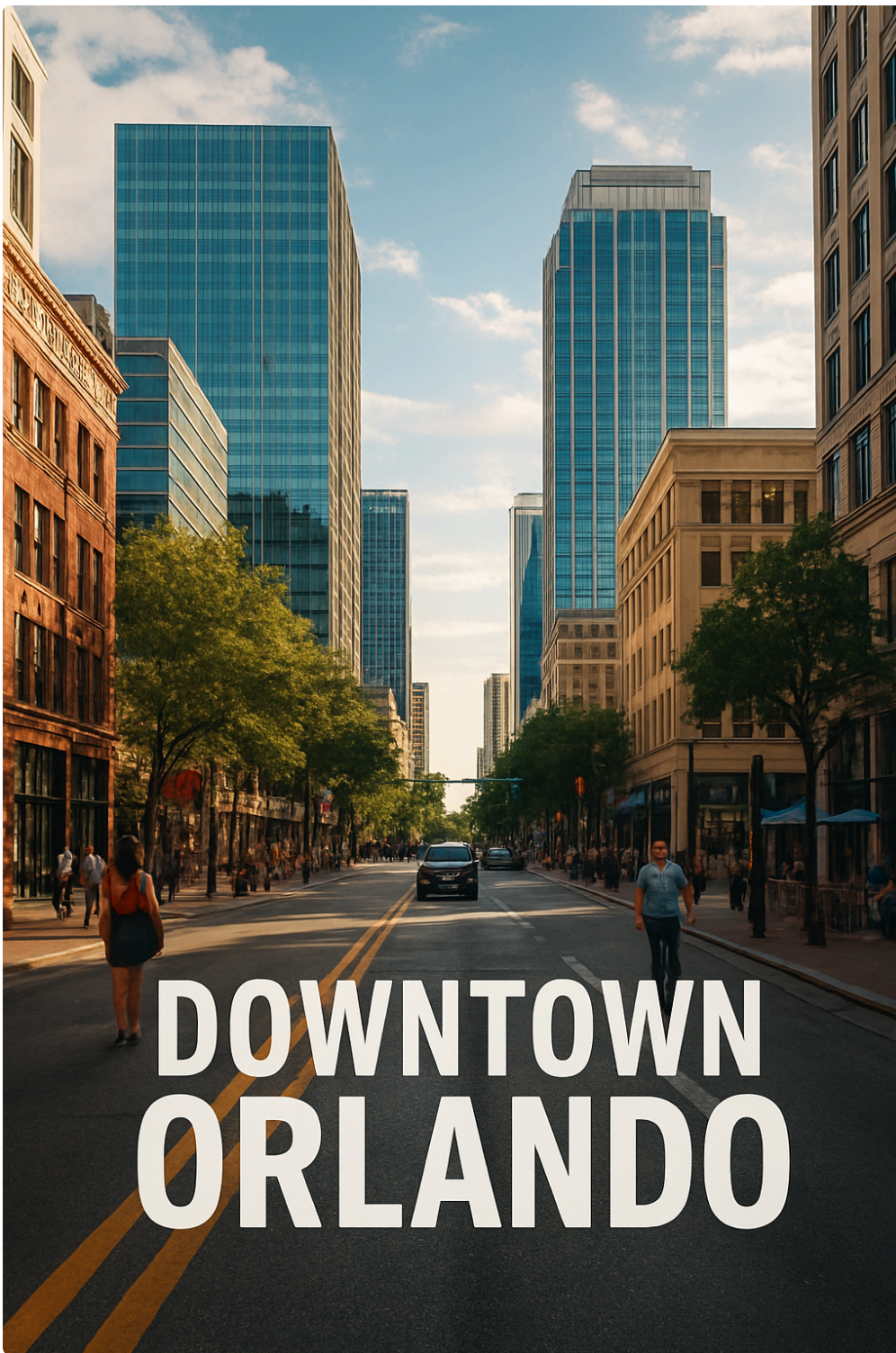
