This single upgrade caused a huge shockwave in the trading neighborhood, completely separating "investable skins" from "practical keys."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all secrets are created equal. For many years, Valve presented several variations of secrets tied to particular collections or occasions.

1. Requirement Case Keys
