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If you reside in Columbus, your trees are working harder than they look. A red maple shading a Clintonville cottage takes lake-effect winds, freeze-thaw cycles, heavy spring rains, and the periodic ice crust that turns branches brittle over night. On the west side, silver maples extend too close to street wires. In Bexley, mature oaks tower above slate roofing systems. When something goes wrong, it typically fails quick. A weak crotch releases in a March storm, a fungi filches the trunk, or a limb drops over the driveway at the worst possible time. That's when you choose whether to climb a ladder yourself or get the phone.
