How CSGO Gambling Sites Operate: The Technical Side

Unlike standard online gambling establishments that use fiat currency (GBP, EUR) or cryptocurrencies, CSGO gambling websites rely heavily on **API combination with Steam**.

When a user desires to deposit or withdraw funds, the process normally follows these steps:

1. **Authentication:** The user logs in by means of OpenID through their official Steam account.
