Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Extremely light wear, often just obvious upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious scratches and endure prominent edges, however the art work stays largely undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear, heavy scratching, and obvious fading of colors.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Extremely used, rusted, or heavily faded. Sometimes looked for after for distinct "black-grind" effects.

- **The Asimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its futuristic, sci-fi orange-and-white visual, covering the AWP, M4A4, and P250.
