- **The Low-Multiplier Auto-Cashout:** Players set an automated cashout at an extremely low multiplier, such as 1.01 x to 1.10 x. While this yields regular, small wins, a single 1.00 x crash can wipe out lots of incremental victories.
- **The Martingale System:** A traditional progressive wagering technique where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recuperate all previous losses plus a profit when they lastly win. This requires an enormous bankroll and frequently strikes table or website limits throughout a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* rather than a loss, trying to take advantage of winning streaks while lessening damage throughout cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for prolonged streaks of low crashes (e.g., several rounds under 1.50 x) and betting high up on a perceived "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This succumbs to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent occasion).
