The Rarity System

Every skin inside a case comes from a specific rarity tier. These tiers figure out the probability of acquiring the product and its prospective value.

percentages above represent the "base" opportunity per opening. The actual "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are incredibly rare, typically estimated at less than 0.0001% for particular high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the video game produces a random number. This number correlates to a specific item within the case's swimming pool.

Float Value & StatTrak

An essential consider identifying a skin's value is its **Float Value**. This is a number in between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

In addition, some skins come with a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the number of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak versions are normally more expensive than their standard equivalents.

The Most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are created equal. Older cases, or those containing famous skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command astronomical rates on the Steam Community Market.

Top 5 Most Expensive Cases

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The initial case. Prices vary greatly however are generally extremely high due to fond memories.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the iconic Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for valuable Gamma Doppler knives.

Is It Worth Opening Cases?

This is the most common question asked by new gamers. Statistically, the expected worth of the skins you get is usually lower than the cost of the key plus the case.

- **Typical Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Average Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, implying your house (Valve) and the market usually profit.

Many gamers will receive "junk" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth cents. Nevertheless, the excitement of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For investment purposes, purchasing the case straight is frequently safer than spending for the secret to open it.

1. Where can I buy cases?

You can buy cases directly from the "Get" area in the CS: GO main menu, or you can buy them from the Steam Community Market for a variable cost.

2. Can I trade up for a case?

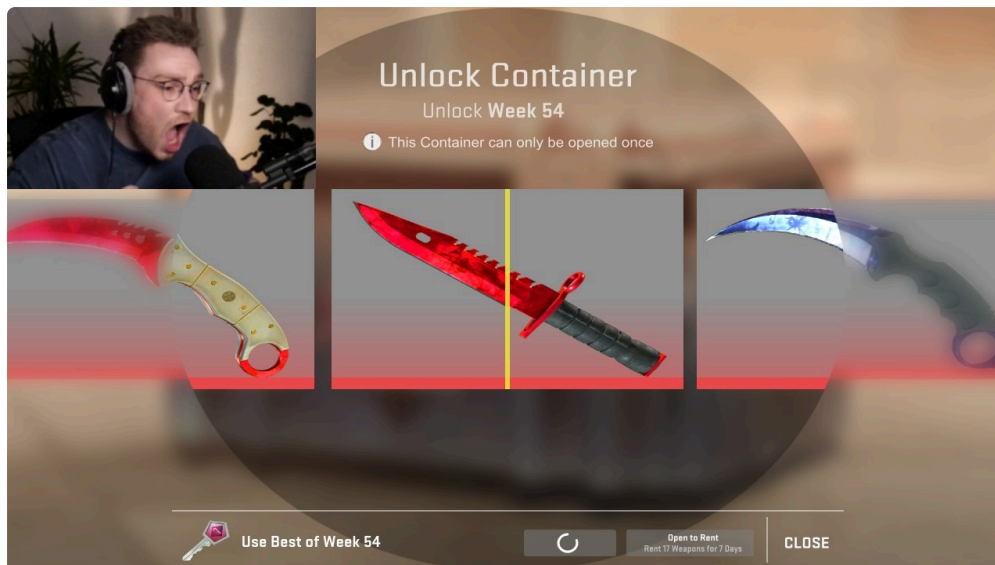
Yes. You can trade up 10 products of a lower tier to get one product of the next tier (approximately Covert), or you can use the "Trade Up Contract" to swap lower-tier items for weapon cases in some circumstances.

3. What takes place to the "Gold" products?

Gold items (Knives and Gloves) are the rarest discovers. They are tradable and can be offered on the Steam Market for real cash (after a 7-day trade hold).

4. Do cases disappear if not opened?

No, cases in your stock do not expire. You can hold onto them indefinitely.



5. Why do some cases cost more than others?

Supply and demand. Older cases are no longer come by the game, making them scarce. If they contain a preferable skin (like the R8 Fade), the cost stays high due to rarity.

While opening them is hardly ever a sound financial decision, the system provides a layer of enjoyment that has kept the Counter-Strike neighborhood engaged for over a years.
