Low (percentage charge drawn from the pot)

- **Mass Trade Bans:** Valve has actually regularly targeted automatic bot accounts used by gambling sites, prohibiting thousands of accounts and rendering billions of dollars worth of skins inaccessible.
- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To slow down the fast transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve introduced a seven-day trade hang on items traded from user stocks. This significantly disrupted the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites trusted.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully forced popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

Regardless of these measures, operators continue to adjust by utilizing peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.
