What often gets overshadowed by attacking highlights is Arsenal's defensive record so far this season. As of today, they have recorded **three clean sheets from three league games** — a statistic that no fan chat can overlook.

Moreover, it's not just the defenders — goalkeeper David Raya is rapidly adding another dimension to Arsenal's defensive credentials.

David Raya's Clean Sheet Milestone and 2023-24 Onward Claim

David Raya has now chalked up several clean sheets this season, and the early data is compelling. According to Sky Sports analysis, this is Raya's **third clean sheet from three league matches** since joining Arsenal — a remarkable start considering he's adjusting to a new team and system.
